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New Year, New Butler Principal's report

Our first term of the 2014-15 Academic year has certainly highlighted many new aspects of Butler College. For many, the most obvious is that, for this year at least, we have a second site: we have over forty postgraduates housed at Ushaw, a beautiful old seminary about four miles from Durham. It has bought many logistical problems which our operations team and the creativity of the students themselves have helped to deal with, but it has also given us access to wonderful new facilities including a dedicated dining room, 300 seater theatre and a cinema room.

We were pleased to meet some new people. Prof. Huang Xu was with us last term as Senior Cofund Research Fellow of the College. He joined us from Hong Kong Polytechnic University and while he was here he researched the issue of how the staff voice is heard in large businesses. We also had a visiting researcher from Charles University in Prague, Jana Zalska, researching argumentation in mathematics classrooms.

Durham University hosted the inaugural "Collegiate Way" conference last term. This was designed to bring together people interested in the college style of residential communities at universities. People often think this is a UK phenomenon restricted to Durham, Cambridge

and Oxford, but the college system is valued in universities in places as varied as the US, South Africa, Australia, China and Abu Dhabi. Indeed, at least 86 different universities around the world have been identified with a collegiate model of living.

Butler and Ustinov Colleges worked closely together to help support the conference. Delegates from the UK, Canada and Macau were housed here and they were invited to take part in the life of the two colleges during the stay. To celebrate, a one-off "Usti-But" joint formal was held between the two colleges and gave us the opportunity to showcase our communities.

There has also been a large change in staffing across Butler in the past few months. With our inaugural Senior Tutor departing, we appointed a new Vice Principal, Karen Langdon, just in time for the start of term. Not that Karen was a stranger: she'd been a mentor in College for a number of years and a lay member of the Trust Board; so we knew we were in safe hands. Karen was joined by Sandra MacDonald as Student Support Officer (undergraduate) in November to complete the student support team.

The awards are the culmination of an enormous amount of hard work on the part of our bar staff, led by Mandy Herron. Older alumni may recall that, when we opened, the College had the biggest


bar in Durham, but in a large a generally unappealing space. The addition of staging, a separated games area, large screen televisions and booth seating have made it much more attractive. A few years ago we were able to add the bar kitchen, which provides pizzas, burgers, pasta and curries and also allows the bar to function as a coffee shop during the day, serving a range of

sandwiches and panini. We are also able to put on basic food for mentor nights, held in the bar every Tuesday and Thursday, encouraging students to meet up in small groups with the mentors.

> The key to Best Bar None, however, was not simply in having a great bar with a good selection of drinks, food and activity. It is also about acting as a community space and demonstrating the ways in which we can promote responsibility. The awarding committee appeared to be particularly pleased by the partnership working between the bar staff and the welfare

team. They worked together on ensuring key messages were put across in Freshers Week, developed the "Know you limits" week and ensured that students have access to 'spikeys'.

Butler Theatre

Michaelmas term has been a particularly busy time for the Society of Theatrical Arts at Butler (STAB). Although the STAB Murder Mystery formal is now an annual event, this year was the first time it was held in Ushaw College. The atmospheric, Gothic Revival setting helped set the tone while the actors took to the stage. The performance was set in a book club where Violet Lynam (Rosie Hodsdon), an unpopular member, died in suspicious circumstances. The audience moved into the refectory which was decorated to resemble the café it was up to them to discover which of the characters was responsible for Violet's murder. At the end of the night, after all of the accusations were in, The Principal, in a cameo role as

a policeman, revealed the murderer to be the friend of Violet's brother in a short confession scene.

Another STAB event at Ushaw last term was the performance of 'The Eve of St Agnes', a piece written by Antonia Goddard, a member of St Cuthbert's Society. The short play, directed by Phoebe

Chan and Rosie Hodsdon, was based on the poem by John Keats and was a romantic, wintery tale of starcrossed lovers. It was set in the Gothic castle of Baron Elroy (Rahul Ravi) who had arranged a marriage based on social standing and wealth for his daughter Madeline (Anisha Solanki) however she had fallen in love with a mysterious stranger. This stranger was Porphyro (James Aitken), a man unjustly exiled and determined to break into the castle in a bid to woo Madeline. As the play reached its climax, a spectactularly choreographed swordfight between Porphyro and the Baron had tragic consequences for all involved.

Langwith has been invited up to Durham later in the year to further cement the relationship that has been built over the last couple of years, and to return their hospitality. The Varsity Weekend in the spring will feature sports and performances and another round of University Challenge, and we will hopefully bring some societies into the range of activities, perhaps even running a bake-off!
