# Happy New (academic) Year Principal's report

Welcome to the first newsletter of the 2015-16 academic year. As we welcome our new intake of undergraduate and postgraduate students, we are beginning to think about new opportunities and the medium term development of the College.

This is our tenth student intake and the end of this year and start of the following academic year will be a time for celebration as we recognise ten years of Josephine Butler College. We've come a long way in that ten years, thanks in large part to the spirit which our students and staff generate in which everyone pulls together to make things work.

As the university welcomes its new Vice-Chancellor, Stuart Corbridge, the College is welcoming a number of new staff. In addition to welcoming a new administrative assistant Natasha Miller, new porters, cleaning staff and resident tutors, we're delighted that Neil Crimes is joining us as Student Support Officer, taking a lead on supporting our postgraduate students and taking on the task of developing new ways to engage our whole college community in the scholarly aspects of College.

Neil will also take charge of our Pre-Sessional Programme. While this is the first newsletter of the academic year, and our full time students have been away over the summer, life at Butler never stops. We have just bid farewell to around 600 students who have been with us for their English Language Programme. A substantial part of this is the collegiate programme which engages these students in seminars, mentoring schemes, visits through the region and across the wider UK, sports and faith visits.

In the newsletter you will find articles on a number of aspects of the college. On page 2 there is a discussion of our support for students of any faith (and none). Our trust board reports on where it has spent some of the generous donations which do so much to enhance the student experience. Our alumni assistant details some of the planned activity with alumni (including, this year, a Durham reunion planned to coincide with the Lumiere exhibition in November).

There is also an article about our expanding fellowship programme. Having had only a single college residential fellow in 2013, in this coming year we will welcome seven distinguished academics from around the world who will engage with the college and our students. In addition, we will be welcoming Alan O'Cain as our artist in residence (jointly with St. Cuthbert's Society).

# **College Fellows**

We are delighted to announce the major expansion of our college fellowship programme. In 2013 we had our first residential college fellow. In 2014 we had three. For 2015-16 we have seven!

Our first term sees Prof. Penny Harvey, Prof. Hubert Locher and Stella Ghervas joining us. Prof. Harvey is the Institute for Advanced Study Butler Fellow. She is Professor of Social Anthropology at the University of Manchester and has worked extensively on technology, the state and social change. While at Durham she will be working on a monograph on decentralisation and regional government in Peru and collaborating with the departments of Anthropology and Geography on a new comparative study of infrastructures and changing state forms.

Prof Locher joins us from the Kunstgeschichtliches Institut, Marburg and is one of the most innovative

## **Faith Support**

Josephine Butler College is a welcoming community for people from any faith (as well as those who have no immediate association with a faith group). The College Chaplain, Andrew Tinkler, has a dual focus in that he provides pastoral and spiritual support for the college members and works with the student body to develop opportunities for community volunteering. While coming from a Catholic background, Andrew both provides one-to-one support in matters of faith and spirituality and can also signpost students to link them in to a range of faith and worship opportunities in the University, the city and the region.

Many students coming to university find that they reflect on their beliefs, values and identity and the chaplain supports students in exploring those questions and enabling them to challenge and develop their faith.

The College has a wide cross-section of students from across the world, each of whom brings their own view of that world with them and the opportunity to debate and discuss cultures and beliefs gives researchers in the field of art history. His work looks at the formation of the art historical canon in Germany and his visit is timely for Durham, coming just as the University has developed the major crossdisciplinary Centre for Visual Arts and Cultures.

Stella Ghervas is a visiting scholar at Harvard's Centre for European studies and she will be working with the Law School while she completes her book on the history of peace.

In addition to our distinguished academic visitors, we are delighted that we will be hosting an artist-in-residence, Alan O'Cain. Alan is both an artist and poet. Born in Sunderland, he has been a teacher and his art encompasses experimental portraiture, drawing and photography. He has had residencies in the Edvard Munch studio in Oslo and is looking forward to a major exhibition of his work at Manchester

The college has a range of events linked to faith across the year, including religious festivals, and supports different social justice projects and interfaith activities. For example, one group is looking at ways in which they might tackle food poverty and social isolation. In addition, we have links to local churches and other faith spaces. Many churches reach out to local students primarily in a social sense (complete with tea and cake!) though also are welcoming to those who wish to participate in religious services.

The university has many opportunities for different faiths to meet together (and meet each other) including societies like the Jewish Society, Islamic Society and links in to faith support for Baha'i, Buddhist, Hindu and Sikh groups (to name a few).

The city and region have many wonderful church and faith spaces (including, of course, what Bill Bryson described as the best cathedral on planet Earth!)

## **Trust Board**

## Funding the student experience.

A Trust Board, with members of the College community as well as external, independent members, oversees our fundraising and expenditure strategies. Compared to older, more established colleges, Butler has much smaller resources to draw upon, but the extra funding we receive from donors is very welcome and can make all the difference to the student experience. It raises money to support both short term requests and to develop a longer term fund for larger projects (including, for example, the building of a tennis court). In particular, at the moment, the Board is allocating some of the money raised to a project for our 10th Anniversary.

In 2014/15 our income from parent and alumni donations was £2640.00. In addition, we received other income from the sale of merchandise and gift aid. The Board received a wide variety of bids over the year and committed £4112. This included support for our student welfare group, presentation music folders, sports equipment for badminton, cricket, football, ultimate frisbee and netball, a new indoor basketball set, lighting equipment for the stage and chair covers for formal dining. The Board has also established hardship funds to ensure that members of the College can access sports and other parts of the student experience.

# **Grace House**

A few years ago as a college we decided we wanted to support Grace House in its development and running. Since then we have raised many thousands of pounds for this cause through a variety of events held in College. In July, a group of us had the privilege of attending a private viewing of Grace House prior to the official opening. Nearly fully finished with a few tweaks to be made, all that is missing are

children! They are now eagerly awaiting a visit from Oftsed to have the final inspection before the facility is given the go ahead to be fully up and running.

Dr Karen Parry, the CEO gave an inspiring tour of the building,

emphasising the key features which really make a difference to the experience of families who visit. There is specialist equipment



respite care, so 'hospice' was dropped from the name. Dr Parry emphasised that due to advancements in medical care, many patients now live much longer. In the North East, the need for hospices is not as great as it was while the need for respite care is greater, so the decision was supported by the trustees.

Although finished and fit for purpose, there are still visions to develop the experience at Grace House further to

> fulfil the requirements to become Centre of Regional Excellence. For example, they would like to develop interactive opportunities in sports and arts for the children, and create services for parents who may also stay. On our calendar for this year, we have added two new fundraising events including a Fun Run 'Race For Grace' and a 'Charity Expedition' similar to the Coast to

Coast Bike Ride which took place last year. We are also hoping to develop a volunteering scheme with Grace House this year, enabling some of our students to visit and provide direct support.
