
Easter Term round-up - St Mary's College stories and events

Inter-MCR Formal – 2nd May – With cherry blossom trees in full bloom, the Middle Common Room invited guests from across the University to the annual Harry Potter inter-MCR formal. The biggest MCR event of the calendar held in the neoclassical 19th-century setting that is the picturesque St Mary's College. Guests were initially greeted by Hedwig the owl on the terrace ahead of a welcoming drinks reception at platform 9 3/4. Following this, guests found their stained name cards in the Dining Hall amongst all four houses with 'bewitched' chocolate frogs at their seats. After a brief interjection by Quirrell during the three course meal, guests made their way down to the three broomsticks bar for a drink, photos in the photobooth, and chocolate coated fruit skewers. Experience of Beekeeping Day - 4th May / 1st June / 2nd June - If you've ever thought or wondered about bees honey, ioining about beekeeping and the St Mary's beekeeping team for an unforgettable beekeeping experience day was the perfect opportunity. St Mary's Beekeeping Society opened its doors for the first time to hold beekeeping experience days, open to students and members of the local Durham community. Participants enjoyed lectures, cosmetic making, wild bee home building and practical beekeeping as part of the day organised by members of the beekeeping society. The day was made possible from the generous support of the St Mary's College Development Fund who fully funded the day. A complimentary lunch and refreshments were provided as well as all the protective clothing and materials. It was a special opportunity for all.

One exciting part of the day was the chance to get up close to the bees and open the hives. Small groups opened a hive to check the general health of the bees with an experienced beekeeper. There were many drones and worker bees to be seen and one lucky group even spotted the queen! In the afternoon wild bee homes were constructed using natural materials such as bamboo and drilled logs. These were designed to attract leaf cutter and mason bees. Participants also had a go at making cosmetics using beeswax (beeswax lip balm and hand lotion bars).





Tiziana de Rogatis – St Mary's St Mary's Fellow ((June 2019)

Tiziana co-organised a two-day international conference on 'Elena Ferrante in a Global Context'. The so-called Neapolitan Novels interweaves culture with some of the emergent topics and issues of globalisation as her female protagonists negotiate the tensions between local identity and national and transnational belonging. The debate resulted in a productive and engaging opportunity to exchange ideas and advance the literature in this field.



Tatiana Churikova - St Mary's Visiting Women's Fellow (April-June 2019)

Tatiana is a Senior Research Scientist in the Laboratory of Petrology, Geochemistry and Mineralogy at the Institute of Volcanology and Seismology in Russia and has been working with colleagues in the Department of Earth Sciences this term.

Valery Katsuba - St Mary's College Visiting Research Fellow (May-June 2019)

Valery was a Resident Research Fellow at St Mary's College in partnership with the Zurbarán Centre for Spanish and Latin American Art in Bishop Auckland. He began writing articles and stories about art and was soon introduced into artistic circles, and in 1999 began to dedicate himself to art using photography and writing as a means for expressing his artistic ideas. His first exhibition took place in the House of Photography in Moscow in 2000. He later exhibited in Madrid (Museo de la Real Academia de Bellas Artes de San Fernando), Mexico City (Museo Nacional de San Carlos), the Academy of Fine Arts in St. Petersburg, etc. Currently his works are in the collections of the National Center of Art and Culture Georges Pompidou (Paris), Museo de la Real Academia de Bellas Artes de San Fernando (Madrid), Art Center 2 de Mayo (Madrid), the State Russian Museum (St. Petersburg) and others. Valery undertook a project at Mary's and took many photographs of the College, College life, societies, sports and idyllic shoots of students and staff, which he hopes to exhibit with the support of the Zurbarán Centre.

Alumni Careers Event – 22nd June – Many thanks to all alumni that attended this event to help inspire our current students and help inform them of what career path to choose, how to best apply skills and interview techniques to gain the upper hand in the recruitment process. A wide range of job sectors were present and this relaxed environment ensured the students were comfortable to ask questions and learn as much information as possible.
